Fillet of Fugu

The fugu, or blowfish is a choice seafood delicacy in Japan where it is often eaten raw.

The filleting preparation takes careful training and a developed expertise as certain parts must be scrupulously avoided for they are poisonous. Several deaths a year occur to adventurous gourmets from eating the fish after careless preparations. Perhaps our little fugu kite, with its puckish mouth and startled eyes demonstrates a successful digestion of some ancestors swimming a fluttering flight to heavenly gastronomical reals.

In making the kite, I chose a Tyvek sail for durability, in lieu of the traditional washi paper. Stick to bamboo for the frame—the woods flexibility works to your advantage, and dowels are overly

stiff and brittle. Felt-tip markers with permanent ink work well for the facial decoration, and shredded tufts of crepe paper add a finishing touch to the stick extension. My bamboo came from a window shade and was quite thin—maybe a bit too flexible. It still flies well in a wide range of winds, giving a deep bow, or dihedral, in wind gusts, or when responding to sharp tugs on the line. Use a three-point bridle, and be careful to set the frame accurately to the positions and angles shown on the drawing.

Construction Tip: When cutting the bamboo, have it straight and of even size. Balance the growth nodes at matching locations, and the distance from the vertical center line of the kite on similar sticks. This corrects both weight distribution and uneven flexure or bending of the frame.
